Rules for visitors

You are visiting a **botanic garden** and we ask you to follow a few simple rules during your visit.

- This is a museum of plants. You may not pick any of the plants, fruits, or seeds that you see.
- It is strictly forbidden to cause damage to any plant material within the garden boundaries.
- Activities such as cycling, fishing, swimming, barbecuing, playing ball, or similar are prohibited.
- Climbing in the trees is also not allowed.
- Please use designated benches and picnic tables, indicated on the map for eating any food you may have brought along. Brought along food may not be eaten in the greenhouses.
- Dogs should be kept on a leash. Only guide dogs are allowed inside the greenhouses.

See plants of the world – all year around

Welcome to the only botanic garden in Stockholm. We grow more than 6.000 species from all over the world – from alpine and forest floras, rainforests and deserts.

There are areas with plant beds such as the Orchard and the Systematic sections. the latter displaying the plants according to their systematic relationships. Other areas display the plants in more natural surroundings, sometimes based on their geographical origins.

In the Edvard Anderson Conservatory you can move from lavenders and brooms of the Mediterranean, to bushlands of South Africa and Australia, and on to the Californian desert. The conservatory also harbours tropical plants including palm trees, insectivorous plants and useful plants such as coffee, tea, and cocoa.

The dome shaped Victoria House was built in 1900 and is one of few similar greenhouses in the world, explicitly built to harbour the giant water lilies of the genus *Victoria*. In and around its central pond are many useful plants from tropical regions such as lotus, taro, sugarcane, and rice.

The garden originated as a donation made by the two brothers Bergius at the end of the 18th century. Since 1885 the garden is located here in Frescati and is today part of the Royal National City Park. Large parts of the garden is protected, classified as state-owned historic building (statligt byggnadsminne).
